When I was seven years old, my mom taught me to float.

She said, "Close your eyes, take a breath, I promise you won't choke."

She said, "The water knows you and water won't let go.

but the molecules will still remember both days.


And then there was Jesus, baptized by John

Written for Pentecost by a British Baptist pastor, this text is full of biblical terms like "Ebenezer" (1 Samuel 7:12), Hebrew for "a stone of help" set up to give thanks for God's assistance. The tune name honors hymnal compiler Asahel Nettleton, who probably did not compose it.

And there was my mother who danced in the rain, and the spring a thunderstorm took everything. The first time I sank, the first time I cried, and babies baptized in hospitals each night.

So as water slowly filled the basin, I wonder, did Jesus remember those spaces those spaces where water had breathed new life, and the spaces where water took with might?

I wonder if he thought of my baptism day, and of the water in Flint, and of hurricanes. I wonder if he could see the joy of summer rains, and how winter snow heals our busiest days.

I wonder if he thought of it in cosmic proportions—water, this source of life and force; water, the source that holds new birth; water, the deep, the dark, the first.

Maybe he did, or maybe he didn't.

He saw a chance to love,
so love, he gave it,
lifting us up as if we were equals—
us a bunch of broken and hurting people.

But in using water, the simplest of things, he wove together a memory chain— of creation, and freedom, and baptism days— for our minds to walk through, to dance in, to know; for our souls to swim through, to cherish, to float.

I should have known I would never be the same.
I should have known that the final night,
when Jesus had his disciples by his side,
would start with water, because that's where it began.
The river runs through—I want to wade in.

Leader: in the human face and the gentle heart,

People: in the warmth of flesh and the depth of soul.

Leader: Out of justice came freedom;

People: and the wisdom of God was revealed

Leader: in the need to grow and the will to love,

People: in the chance to know and the power to choose.

Leader: And God looked at the creation,

All: and behold, it was very good.

PRAYER OF CONFESSION & ASSURANCE OF FORGIVENESS

People: Loving God, you pour out grace upon us exactly as we are,

but we confess we are suspicious and react from fear of scarcity.

You invite us to take our shoes off

and receive the care our bodies need, but we sit on our heels.

We sort bodies into worthy and unworthy ones to mask our insecurities.

We reject and punish fat bodies, disabled bodies,

transgender bodies, and racialized bodies—

even when these bodies are our very own.

God, remind us that we are made in your image.

Help us learn to receive from your abundance so we can share all that we have

with others. Let us see that the cups we longingly hold out are already full.

May they overflow so that all will have enough!

Leader: As he does with Peter in the footwashing, Jesus transforms our confusion and

rejection into joy and connection. With God's help and mercy, we can reciprocate abundance with one another and with Creation. In Jesus Christ we are loved and

befriended by God.

All: Thanks be to God.

INVITATION TO THE TABLE

PRAYER OF GREAT THANKSGIVING

Leader: Why do we give thanks and praise before this table?

People: We give thanks for God's work of creation and salvation.

Leader: It is our greatest joy, creator God, to give you thanks in every time and place.

You made the heavens and the earth and all that is in them—sun, moon and stars, mountains, rivers and trees, animals and people. You even made us in your

own image to love and serve you, and you show us your mercy every day.

Therefore, with all people and all creation we shout your praise:

People: Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of

your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of

the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Leader: All glory and blessings are yours, Saving God, for in your mercy you gave your

only Son, Jesus Christ. Born a child like us, he grew up to be your servant.

Jesus taught your truth. He welcomed, healed, forgave and loved people.

In the end, he suffered and died to save us from our sin. And God raised him up,

to give us a new life. We praise you that before he died, our Savior gave us this

holy meal to eat together until he comes again. Why do we eat bread at this table?

People: On the night before he died, Jesus took bread. After giving thanks, he broke

it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: "Take, eat. This is my body, given for

you. Do this in remembrance of me."

Leader: Why do we drink from the cup at this table?

People: The same night, Jesus took the cup, saying: "This cup is the new covenant

sealed in my blood, shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do

this in remembrance of me."

Leader: What do we remember at this table?

People: We remember God's gracious love for us, Christ's death and resurrection for

us, and the Spirit's tender care for us. And remembering, we offer ourselves

as gifts for the world.

Leader: According to our Lord's commandment:

People: We remember his death, we proclaim his resurrection, we await his coming in

glory.

Leader: What do we ask at this table?

People: Merciful God, pour out your Holy Spirit on us and on these gifts of bread and

wine, that in eating and drinking together we may be made one with Christ and with one another. At this table we ask for unity in Christ our Lord, and we ask for strength to serve the world in his name until the day you make all

things new.

Leader: Through Christ, all glory and honor are yours, Almighty God, with the Holy

Spirit in the holy church, now and forever. Amen.
