Advent Devotionals

Let us light candles!

This year I hope you will join me in using Presbyterians Today's Advent and Christmas devotional, "Let Us Light Candles: Matthew 25 and the work of Advent." This extended online devotional will take us through Epiphany, January 6. It brings to you the inspiring words of Howard Thurman, a hero of mine, in his poem "I Will Light Candles This Christmas." Printed copies of the devotional will be available from the church office in addition to the online option (pcusa.org/2020advent).

As part of our celebration of the season, I invite you to take pictures of lit candles in your home. Text or email them to me (pastorjohn@fpcokc. org or 405-420-6383). We will add them to our worship space as we light candles this Christmas in celebration of the light that conquers all darkness. This year more than ever we need to celebrate the Advent of Christ.

From the devotional introduction: "Thurman, a Baptist pastor, theologian and civil rights activist, was born in 1899. The grandson of a former slave, Thurman was named by Life magazine in 1953 as one of the 12 greatest preachers in the country. The pastor not only co-founded San Francisco's Church for the Fellowship of All Peoples in 1944 — the first interfaith and intercultural congregation in the United States — but he also mentored a young Martin Luther King Jr., who received his Ph.D. in 1955 at Boston University, **CONTINUED...**

where Thurman was serving as the first Black dean of Marsh Chapel.

Thurman's most well-known book, "Jesus and the Disinherited," published in 1949, illustrates the pastor's theology. In it he expounds on Jesus' example of unconditional love and illustrates how that love not only helps the disinherited endure oppression, it also changes the heart of oppressors.

Nowhere better can Thurman's belief in such a redemptive, transformative love be seen than in his writings about the light that came into the world at Christmastime.

Our world has been shrouded in the darkness of racial and political unrest, and the cloud of pandemic uncertainties is still hovering low. But there is a light coming to us, one promised by God. It is a light that John's Gospel says 'shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it' (John 1:5)."

ADVENTure To-go

Chrismons for Christmas

This year we cannot gather for ADVENTure, so ADVENTure is coming to you! You are encouraged to join us in making a Chrismon ornament for your tree this year. Everything you will need to create your very own Chrismon will be mailed to your home.

A Chrismon tree is an evergreen tree often placed in the chancel of a church during Advent and Christmastide. The evergreen tree itself symbolizes the eternal life Jesus Christ provides. The Chrismon tree differs from the traditional Christmas tree in that it is decorated only... with clear lights and Chrismons made from white and gold material, the two being the liturgical colors of the Christmas season.

The Chrismon tree is adorned with Chrismons, ancient symbols for Christ or some part of Christ's ministry. Common examples include the dove descending, fish, the Celtic cross, the Jerusalem cross, the shepherd's crook, a chalice and many others.

Reserve the Third

December 4 & 5 | 9:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m.

Our last Reserve the Third this year will involve our traditional Christmas activities, but with a twist. Fran Smith has diligently worked with The Urban Mission to find out their needs and it turns out the traditional Christmas Food Boxes will come to them prepacked from a group called Farm to Table at no expense to us.

Therefore, instead of helping with that effort we will be purchasing and packaging 370 hygiene bags.

- On Friday, Fran will need four individuals to help set up an assembly line. This is expected to take between one and two hours.
- On Saturday, because of the needed Covid precautions of at least six feet between volunteers, we will take empty bags and go from station to station, filling it with items until full. The bags will then be placed in a large container and the process will repeat itself until we've finished. It is anticipated this will take between two and three hours.

Grandmother Helen Rickard's No Bake Pumpkin Cheesecake

This recipe comes from Michelle Evans' grandmother. Helen Rickard, who was a member of FPC, would make this every year for Thanksgiving. It quickly became an Evans Family favorite!

Ingredients:

- 8 oz. cream cheese (softened)
- 1 cup + 1 tablespoon milk (divided)
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 8 oz. whipped topping
- Graham cracker crust (my grandma used a homemade ginger snap crust, but this substitute works great too)
- 15 oz. pumpkin (canned)
- 2 packages instant vanilla pudding (4 servings size each)
- 1 tsp. ground cinnamon
- 1 tsp. pumpkin spice

Instructions:

- 1. Beat together the cream cheese, 1 tablespoon of milk and sugar in a large bowl. Fold in 1/2 of the whipped topping and spread in the graham cracker crust.
- 2. Whisk together 1 cup of milk, pumpkin, dry pudding mixes and spices until creamy. Spread over the cream cheese layer.
- 3. Top with the remaining 1/2 tub whipped topping and refrigerate for at least 4 hours.

In-Person Worship

During the pandemic, when allowed to do so, the Session of First Presbyterian has allowed in-person worship in addition to livestreaming all services. In order to do this as safely as possible, worshippers are required to wear a mask at all times while inside the building. Worshippers are separated when seated in the Sanctuary by eight feet front to back, with a minimum of six feet between individuals or an individual and a household group, decreasing capacity by 90%.

Even with these measures, the safest place for you to worship is from your own home. We appreciate the large number of members that are joining us faithfully week after week using the website and Facebook. We are currently upgrading our livestreaming ability to enhance that experience.

We rejoice and give thanks to God that this is temporary. We give thanks to God for the progress being made toward effective, safe vaccines and that we are one day closer to being able to come back together as a congregation in ways we long for.

The Session is responsible for worship and for the entire mission and ministry of a particular Presbyterian Church. This is an unprecedented time to carry such responsibility. Please pause at the end of reading this article and pray for them. Pray for the men and women you have identified to guide this congregation. Pray for their wisdom and endurance as they continue to shepherd God's people through a difficult time.

Christmas Eve Services

On Christmas Eve, we will have a Young and Young at Heart service at 4:00 p.m. and our Service of Lessons and Carols at 10:30 p.m. (the prelude will begin at 10:00 p.m.). Both services will be held in the Sanctuary.

At the time of this printing, both will be in person and livestreamed. We will continue to monitor community spread and post updates as necessary.

Masks are required to be worn at all times during both services. Worshippers will be spaced in excess of CDC guidelines. Seating for both services is reserved and limited to church members and their families until **December 15**. At that time, if there are remaining seats, they will be available to the community.
