





# **Greetings from the Pastor**

## Clerk of Session

The primary duties of the Clerk are to record and preserve the minutes of Session meetings, maintain Church membership rolls, and provide informational extracts to other Church governing bodies upon request.

In addition, the Clerk is responsible for correspondence related to Certificates of Transfer and Baptismal records, as well as assisting with the Installation of Elders and Deacons.

The Clerk is also responsible for maintaining records of births, deaths, marriages, membership, baptisms, and service records of Elders, Deacons, and Trustees.

#### In 2022:

- Completed the 2021 Annual Statistical Report to Presbytery/General Assembly.
- Attended and recorded the minutes of 11 monthly Session meetings. No meeting was convened
  in July.
- Attended and recorded minutes of two Congregational Meetings:
  - February 27 for the purpose of sharing the 2021 Necrology Report, distribution of the Annual Report, presentation of the 2022 Budget, and to approve any changes to the Pastoral compensation package and terms of call.
  - October 23 for the purpose of receiving and acting upon the report of the Nominating Committee for electing officers: Elders, Deacons, Trustees, and the 2024 Nominating Committee.
- Distributed minutes to Session members, and following approval, filed minutes for the permanent record of the Church.
- Participated in 9 baptism services
- Participated in services in which 12 new members were received into the life of First Presbyterian Church of Oklahoma City.

## **Director of Music and Arts**

After the complexities of the pandemic years of 2020 and 2021, 2022 proved to be a more typical year for the Music and Arts Ministries at First Presbyterian Church as we continued to give glory to God through our music!

All our ensembles—the Sanctuary Singers, the Sanctuary Ringers, and the Treble Choir—continued to grow in spirit and musical skill in 2022, and they served the congregation by providing engaging music for worship services throughout the year.

As ever, John Edwards makes excellent music in worship on a weekly basis. His tireless efforts to select pieces appropriate for the scriptures and liturgy provide meaningful musical experiences for the congregation. Cady Lewis led the Treble Choir, teaching our young members the joy of singing while learning new musical skills.

I am very grateful to the soloists who have been the backbone of our music program during this pandemic. Cady Lewis and Jennifer Coffman are excellent leaders for the choir and sing beautifully in worship. Noah Morgan left FPC-OKC in May of 2022 to pursue other



opportunities as he completes his education at OCU. Mitchell Gage, who had led the bass section since the fall of 2019, suffered a stroke in March, and we continue to pray for him as he travels the long path of recovery with his family in Iowa. We are so grateful to both Noah and Mitchell for sharing their gifts of music with us.

Several members have played instruments in worship, including Linda Bosteels, Gary Bryant, Dorothy Hays, and Hannah and Miriam Lusby. The Blackwelder Brass augmented our worship in the spring and fall, and the Oklahoma Scottish Pipes and Drums joined us for Homecoming Sunday and Reformation Sunday.

The Kemp Concert Series continued its return to normal operations with two live, in-person concerts in 2022: a performance of the Beethoven Mass in C by the Kemp Concert Choir in May (rescheduled from its original date of May 2020) and a delightful concert by the Vienna Boys Choir in November.



It continues to be a delight to witness the joy that this congregation takes from music in praise of God, whether we are together in person or in spirit through livestream. I am blessed to work with such a skilled and dedicated team, leading amateur and professional musicians alongside a congregation that praises God with every breath and sound!

#### **Deacons**

The theme for the Deacons in 2022 was *Fellowship*, and we looked for ways to do that together as a congregation. With three regular meals that we've sponsored for many years, we were able to gather at Easter with our annual brunch, our Back-to-School Lunch to gather school supplies, and our New Member Lunch to celebrate those joining FPC-OKC since 2019. The Free Little Pantry across the street from the church also received a monthly donation.

During 2022, the Deacons were finally able to get back to normal activities for the majority of the year. We started having coffee and cookies in the Reception Center in January—it was suspended for the next two months because of the pandemic, but we were able to resume in April.

On Mother's Day, the women in the congregation were given roses and the men of the church received a Braum's gift card on Father's Day. Our two high school graduating seniors were each presented with \$500. We sent birthday cards to members and organized Lunch/Supper Shuffle groups twice during the year.

We attended Session meetings to keep the Elders up to date on our activities and once a month we shared those items with the congregation during worship. Each Deacon reached out to four FPC-OKC members by either visiting, calling, and/or writing notes. We were able to take communion four times to members in their homes. As one person stated, "This is a ministry to those members

who can no longer be with us in worship." An Out & About trip to a Dodger's baseball game was fun for members, and we continue to have a prayer list and prayer chain for joys, sorrows, and healing.

On the last two Sundays of December, we handed out Christmas gifts to members. Each received a 100-piece jigsaw puzzle of the Chancel Window, also known as the Witness Window. We delivered puzzles to those who were unable to be in church those Sundays.

Thanks to Scott Wilson, moderator; Blaine Moore, vice-moderator; and Seth Keeton, secretary, for



leading the Diaconate this past year. We also thank Lacey Howard, Travis Johnson, John Woodard, and Scott for their three years of service on the Board as well as Bert Orza for her one year of service. We look forward to having Bill Hancock, Wes Howard, Amy Martin, and Jamie Slade join the Board in 2023. Other members serving are Blaine as moderator; Elizabeth Hatcher, vice moderator; Holly Guadiana, secretary; and John Ellis, Seth Keeton, Sam Borquaye, Barbara Namminga, and John Woodard (filling an unexpired 2-year term). Rev. John McKinnon's leadership has been invaluable.

The Deacons are funded entirely by your donations, so we continue to be appreciative of your support. We will continue our job of reaching out to the members of this congregation with the guidance of the Holy Spirit and the will of God!

## **Nurture Committee**

In 2022, the Nurture Committee was hard at work with programs to foster Christian spirituality among First Presbyterian members, young and old. The year marked a gradual loosening of Covid restrictions, and the committee's strategies reflected a continuing sensitivity to the safety of members and guests.

Under the Nurture umbrella there are several organizations that conduct activities in the building during the week. These include SPARK, First Presbyterian School, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and El Sistema. These programs provide a wonderful use of our facilities for thoughtful and constructive programs.

The Nurture Committee overseas and supports a number of ongoing church programs. Those include the nursery, youth, and children's ministries, adult Sunday school classes, and KirkNight. This year adult Sunday School opportunities included the Evergreen, Builders, New Beginnings, and Pastor's classes. The year also saw the return of KirkNight, structured as "KirkNight To-go," and offered an opportunity for members to pick up meals prepared by Junebug Catering each Wednesday.

In addition to these ongoing activities, the Nurture Committee sponsored a number of one-time events in 2022. These included the distribution of yard signs to church members for both Lent and Advent; providing gifts to confirmands Max Keith and Caroline Kivett and high school graduates Miriam Lusby and Robert Cochran; a very successful Fall Festival (under the great leadership of Erica Taylor); ADVENTure; and Rally Day. A special event in 2022 was the Homecoming lunch where a number of current and former FPC-OKC members we had not recently seen joined us for a homecoming celebration.



A special outreach of the church in 2022 was the sponsorship of a work/study trip undertaken by a group of high school youth from McKinney, Texas. This trip was organized primarily by John McKinnon. It included time for work at The Urban Mission and for a study of domestic terrorism (including a trip to the Oklahoma City Bombing Memorial and Museum), with time left for fun and fellowship (including a pool party at the home of Mark and Mary Ann Doolen). We hope this outreach can be continued and expanded in future years!

A special word of appreciation goes to Cyndi Lockwood. Cyndi has done an outstanding job of organizing quality Christian education programs for our youth of all ages and played an instrumental role in a number of events involving our youth, including the Easter Egg Hunt and ADVENTure.

We anticipate that in 2023 we will be able to take a few more steps in the return to normalcy. The Nurture Committee stands ready to provide interesting, creative, and challenging opportunities for the congregation's spiritual growth.

#### **Children & Youth Ministry**

2022 marked the year that we were back to full-time meeting in person for Sunday School and during worship after the children's sermon.

Sadly, we had to say goodbye to Sean Smith as he ventured west to continue his studies in drama and acting. He was a huge asset to our program and is greatly missed. We wish him the best!



Our biggest undertaking was hosting a full-fledged Bible School for six Sundays, beginning in July and continuing through August. It was a *Monumental* adventure with a southwest theme and taught monumental ideas about God. Kids participated in singing favorite Bible School songs, teamwork building games,



science experiments, eating desert-themed snacks, and collecting desert toy figurines to remind them of their adventures. We had over 20 children attend this "monumental" event. While the kids met, their parents enjoyed a breakfast fellowship time together. We look forward to repeating this program in 2023.

The desire for a Bible School curriculum with a central theme supported by Bible stories and practical, real-life examples in our children's lives prompted a hunt for a new Sunday School curriculum. An all-digital one was found called *Dig In, Foundations of Faith*. It has been used since the Sunday after Rally Day with positive success.

# **SPARK** - Support Program of Art and Reading for Kids!

2022 was a wonderful year for the SPARK Program. Many great things happened. Last spring, we had around 40 children enrolled in after school care. I am excited to say we are ending the year with over 60 children enrolled, which is significant as our licensed capacity is 60 children per day!

In the Fall of 2022, we were able to bring back before school care and have been caring for and transporting a group of 17 children to seven schools. Before school child care is a needed service in our area and we are happy to provide it. For after school care, we've been able to transport and care for children attending ten schools in our area, and



we were able to start a partnership with the new charter school, Western Gateway, in the Wheeler District! We hope to increase our presence there and provide more child care for families in the years to come.

Our staff have been working hard to further themselves professionally and educationally. Our staff are blessed to all be able to qualify for a scholarship to Oklahoma City Community College to pursue a Certificate of Mastery in Child Development or an Associates in Child Development!





In 2022, we had two teachers take the plunge and begin courses. Two more teachers have committed to start college at OCCC in 2023. How amazing is that? We're so proud of our teachers and can't wait for our children to reap the benefits as each teacher learns and grows through the Scholars for Excellence in Child Care scholarship program. Each teacher has also been working hard to advance in their careers through training opportunities, applying for certificates of achievement through the Center for Early Childhood Professional Development, and striving to get higher Professional Development Ladder levels through the CECPD as well. We have an amazing group of teachers who genuinely love working with our children, and we are lucky to have them.



SPARK has been a 2 out of 3-Star facility through Oklahoma's quality rating and improvement system, Reaching for the Stars, since 2004. In 2022, the state announced they were revamping the whole program and would be adding two additional star levels. We decided to go big or go home. We are excited to announce that SPARK achieved the highest star level and was awarded 5 stars!

In addition to our state subsidy contract to provide child care for families who qualify for state assistance and our tribal contract with the Caddo Nation for native children, we were granted a contract with the Delaware Nation in 2022 and we're working on getting a contract with the Kickapoo Nation in 2023.

2023 will be our 39th year serving our community and I have a feeling it is going to be spectacular!

We would like to thank everyone who has given to our program with your gifts and talents over the past year. You have helped make SPARK a place where parents know their children are loved and well cared for and where school-age children can thrive.

## **Boy Scouts**

Our Scouts earned more than 40 Merit Badges and participated in a host of other activities, including rock climbing, welding, fishing, shooting sports, and gardening. The Troop also participated in several service projects, including Cub Scout Octoberfest and Cub Scout Winter Days.

The Troop has 15 adult leaders. Three of our Eagle Scouts spent the summer as staff members at Scouting Seabase, a high adventure site located in the Caribbean



that is focused on ocean activities. Our Committee Chair is Troop 15 Eagle Scout Stephen Harris, and our Scoutmaster is Bill Hensley. Our Troop Committee helps execute the program that is developed by the Scouts each year. Our adult volunteers include Treasurer, Advancement Chair, Fundraising Chair, and Outdoors Program Chair. ## First Presbyterian School

In 2022, First Presbyterian School set many goals for our program. Our top five goals were to grow our program to pre-pandemic levels, improve our classrooms, stabilize our staffing issues, increase our enrollment, and add new programs to our curriculum. During 2022, First Presbyterian School accomplished many of the goals we set for ourselves with the help of our amazing staff, families, and grant money from the state.

In late spring, we were able to welcome our families back into the building. This act alone has helped bring back the connection between our families and teachers. While it can be loud during drop-off and pick-up, children's laughter is a joyous sound.



FPS applied for and received grant money from the state of Oklahoma, and we used those funds in 2022 to focus on improvements to our classrooms. This summer we were able to have all the classrooms, cabinets, and windows painted. We also had new blinds installed in all of the rooms.

In addition to the cosmetic changes, we were also able to finalize the creation of our new Zen Zone, which is a tranquil place for individual students or entire classes to focus on breathing and other de-stimulating strategies to help strengthen emotional regulation.

Along with adding Zen Zone activities, we have revamped our specials programs. Now our preschool students receive physical exercise, art, library, dramatic play, and STEM each week. These programs allow our students to learn many skills through play and hands-on experiments. Without even realizing it, they are learning conflict resolution and creative problem solving all while having fun with their friends.

In August, we reopened the baby room. We began the 2022-23 school year with six sweet children from the age of six months to one year old. FPS now has seven classes serving children from six months to five years old.



Currently, we have strong, dedicated, and dependable staff. During this economic time, we are grateful for our amazing staff.

In 2023, we plan to update and enrich all our programs, playground, and continue to grow our enrollment. First Presbyterian School would like to thank the congregation for its continued support of our program. We are proud to partner with First Presbyterian Church for our 23rd year and look forward to many more to come!

## **Mission Council**

First Presbyterian Church of Oklahoma City is actively involved in mission work in our local community, as well as regionally and internationally. One fourth of our budget went to Indian Nations Presbytery, along with portions of our special offerings. We continue to financially support Jesus House, Goodland Academy, Cornell Gallagher's Free Little Pantry, and The Urban Mission. In 2022, we increased our support and connection with Hope House of Guthrie and Pivot in OKC. We also added Norman Care-A-Vans and Innocence Project to the local charities we support.

Our monthly purple bag donations alternated between The Urban Mission and the Afghan refugees. Our Christmas food boxes and hygiene bags went to 330 families this year. Over 40 volunteers were on hand to help with assembling and filling the boxes.

FPC-OKC has continued to support the Afghan refugees settling in Oklahoma, including financial support for setting up apartments, assistance with household items, purchasing books for the summer reading program, computers, and winter clothing.

## **Board of Trustees**

The Board of Trustees is responsible for oversight of the church property and facilities—a task at times daunting due to the challenge of an aging building, but tempered by its beauty.

Physical Plant: All other projects were overshadowed by the need to replace the over twenty-year-old air chiller (airconditioning system). Although very expensive, Trustees and Session agreed there was no other reasonable option. Temporary equipment was rented to enable worship and all programs to operate during the hot weather. The order was placed and the unit manufactured. Its arrival for installation is anticipated in the next few weeks. Beautiful new carpet has been installed in the Chapel thanks to a generous gift from a congregant couple. The Chancel lighting has been replaced—a long overdue project and not an easy task because a ramp had to be built to allow the use of a lift to reach the ceiling. Due to prior installation issues, the carpet in the Sanctuary has been replaced for the second time (at no cost) which allowed for some changes to further enhance the sound of music. Thanks to the Creation Care Team, three new trees were planted adjacent to the playground. Maintenance projects were numerous and are eternal, but in 2022 included various



stairwell painting projects, dealing with standing water issues in the courtyard, eliminating issues with kitchen drainage, and the removal of several dead trees.

<u>Building Use</u>: As the community emerged from Covid restrictions, building use increased significantly. In addition to worship services, programs including SPARK, El Sistema, First Presbyterian School, and Boy and Girl Scouts moved full speed ahead. Richard Hatcher served as liaison to Boy Scouts. Joyfully, many old friends including Triad, the Kemp Concert Series, TACTUS, the Society of Strings, and OCU Vespers returned. For the first time, FPC-OKC was the location for filming a scene in a movie. Trustees conducted a transportation survey with vehicle users and continued to review and revise safety and use procedures for both internal and external groups.

Administrative: Annual contracts with tenants Junebug Catering, Indian Nations Presbytery, First Presbyterian School, and El Sistema were updated and renewed. All tenants received a rent increase this year. Legal guidance pertaining to all usage was provided. An ad hoc committee to determine the desire and feasibility of a FPC-OKC Columbarium was established with Eric Foster as chair and additional members Kay Brown, Fran Smith, Jamie Slade, and Richard Hatcher. This committee's work will continue into the new year. Trustees also forwarded nominations to the Endowment Fund Board of Trustees for Session approval.

Thanks to Trustees Harold Namminga, Wayne Osmond, Bret Sholar, Don Carter, Dan MacLemore, Susan Perry-LeGrand, Richard Hatcher, Brad Davenport, and Eric Foster for their diligence and enthusiasm and to Jack Lancaster, Facilities Manager, for his dedication.

Delivery of the meals is very important because these folks have actual contact with the recipients, making sure they are all right. This contact and friendship really are equally important to the meal. (\*not an FPC-OKC member)

There are other requirements to make this mission work—such as preparing boxes to be filled with the meals, planning menus, buying food and supplies, scheduling cooks and drivers/deliverers, and keeping records—that's my job right now.

What happens when building closures occur on Mondays or Fridays? On the previous meal day, we include a bag of meal and snack items. For instance, in 2022 the building was closed on Memorial Day; Labor Day; Friday, November 25; and Monday, December 26.

While we have been affected by availability of some items from time to time as well as the increase in prices, so far we have been able to continue to provide nutritious, delicious, and pleasing-to-the-sight meals!

We are truly grateful for those who cook, drive/deliver, and provide funds for the continuation of this important ministry. Some have gone "above and beyond" what the ministry asks. We can certainly use more volunteers and invite anyone to visit us on a Monday or Friday morning for a cup of coffee and maybe a pastry to see just what is involved. Come to "Gayle's Kitchen" in the basement between 9:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. Our normal coffee time is 10:00 a.m.—things are cooking by that time and we can take a break!

## **RAT Pack**

The Repair, Alteration, and Transformation (RAT) Pack has completed its 26th year of volunteer service to the church. - Cleaned the basement window well and north staircase to the mechanical room from the playground.
- Assisted with placing/removing banners in Sanctuary.
- Repaired two piano benches, one from the bell choir rehearsal room and one from the choir rehearsal room.
- John Ellis constructed and installed a new food distribution cabinet for Cornell Gallagher's Free Little Pantry.

## **Resource Council**

The Resource Council is responsible for developing and monitoring the budget of the church. It also reviews the organization and operation of the staff of the church. The church began and ended the year in a very strong financial position.

2022 was a positive year with one major exception, the loss of our air-conditioning equipment. All of our sources of revenue exceeded our budget. Our members continued to support the church with meaningful tithes and offerings of \$643,946. These donations were larger than our budget. Over the years, members have donated oil and gas leases to the church. Because of higher oil and gas prices, revenues from these leases were also higher than our budget. The church rents space in our building to various organizations. This revenue source was also higher than our budget. Finally, distributions from our endowment significantly exceeded past distributions. Our very large endowment of over \$15 million provides our church with financial support that is both remarkable and sustainable.

On the expense side, the cost of the personnel of our church, like most churches, is about one-half of the total budget. Those expenses this year were slightly below our budget. The other expenses were all also as anticipated with one large exception. Just before summer, our air-conditioning equipment failed. Because of the age of the unit, it was more economical in the long run to buy new equipment rather than making repairs to the old unit. Because new units were not immediately available, it was necessary to rent temporary units to get us through the hot summer months. We also had to provide security for these units. The total cost of the new equipment, renting the temporary units, and providing security was \$587,000.

Fortunately, for several years the church has maintained a meaningful position in cash and short-term investments. These funds have been used to fund part of the yearly operating deficit. They have occasionally been replenished by bequests and other non-recurring events. We started this year with a balance of \$968,000. To pay for the air-conditioning unit, we utilized these funds and drew the balance down to a year-end-total of \$424,000. While this is much lower than it has been in the past, it is still a comfortable amount.

In our endowment, most of the funds have restrictions that only allow interest and earnings to be distributed, but not the principal amount. However, there are three funds that allow for the principal to be withdrawn if requested by the Session. To supplement our cash balance, the Session has requested that \$200,000 be withdrawn from the endowment in 2023. Those funds can always be returned to the endowment if they are not needed.

In summary, because of the generosity of many members of our church over the decades, we sustained a major financial surprise in 2022 and are still in a strong financial position.
